Lillian Dowling Receives First Great South Bay Quilters Lifetime Membership Award





This month, my special sewing someone is Providence Block. We were just chatting about things that are interesting for the Newsletter, and I asked about her favorite pincushion. Well! She told me something about her pincushion I still have

trouble imagining!

Her pincushion is an old tomato type pincushion. The ones we have all had hanging out forever! And even when we get gorgeous ones made by Gerrie,

we still don't want to throw them away.

A slight digression: every year since about 1976 my parents would play a VHS of "1776." One of the plot lines involves John Adams asking Abigail to make him gunpowder to win the war. She responds that she won't do so until he buys her pins to sew with. There is a shortage of pins in Massachusetts Bay Colony. (This is also where one of my favorite lines of all time comes from, when she sees the look on his face and says, "Don't smirk at me, you egotist!")

Anyway, back to Providence and her pincushion. Before throwing it out, she opened it up! Cut the fabric and looked inside at the stuffing. Do you know what she found??? 68 needles! And how many times have we all said: I have a million needles in those house...and I can't get my hands on ONE of them to sew a button on!

Recipe: Katherine Hepburn Brownies (Rich but not too sweet)





1 stick unsalted butter 1 tsp vanilla

1 cup sugar Pinch of salt

2 eggs 1 cup coarsely chopped

1/4 cup all-purpose flour walnuts or pecans

1/2 cup cocoa

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. 2. Melt the butter on low head and mix with the cocoa. You can use either a small pot on the stove or a glass bowl in the microwave. 3. Add the sugar and make sure the mixture is not hot.. 4. Mix in the eggs and vanilla. You can use a whisk, or a spoon or fork 5. Add flour, salt, and nuts. Stir until combined. 6. Pour into an 8" x 8" pan. 7.Bake in oven for about 40 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the middle of a muffin comes out clean. Cool before cutting.



Mug Rug Swap!

Who doesn't love a chance to make a mug rug! In February, Sarajean organized a fun project: participants wrote down two things that they loved on index cards, such as tea, gardening, strawberries, etc.

Sarajean collected the cards and put them in a bag. Next, participants chose someone else's card...and made a mug rug that their chosen

54-40 or Fight: Perfect Points or Frustration?

Have you ever done a quilt with the 54-40 or Fight block? How did you like it? Switching from half-square triangles to 60 degree triangles can be a challenge! But what if you are using an accepted expert's ruler, and it just doesn't deliver those crisp and perfect points you are looking for?

I was trying to inspire some quilters to sew some donation quilts with 54-40 or Fight blocks alternating with Shoo Fly blocks for some interesting circular movement and a bit of a challenge.

Should be fun, right?

Except they were using the Fons & Porter 60 degree triangle ruler...and the points weren't tapering to the edgeswell, technically to 1/4" of the edges!

Templates weren't an option, because different quilters have different widths of pencil marks and cutting accuracy.

They looked up Missouri Star ideas... and they found a video on this block: although their points were worse! They posted a video called "Make a "54-40 or Fight Freestyle" Quilt with Jenny from the Missouri Star Quilt Co." She is pictured in the third photo at right. Surprise! It uses the Fons & Porter 60 degree ruler! It's cute, but it doesn't have perfect points!

In the Eleanor Burns quilt she is pictured with, you can see her red star

points are absolutely perfect!


I measured Eleanor's Square in a Square ruler...it has a 53 degree angle! I would have been so much happier if the angle were 54 degrees, since the block is supposedly named for a latitude describing the US/Canada border.


