Favorites on the Internet

Almost everyone has heard of Etsy. You can buy or sell handmade and vintage items, as well as sewing, knitting and quilting supplies..

Many of the artists are excellent, and it's nice to be able to support other creative people.

You can also find a huge variety of original patterns and quilt designs. Some are particularly tempting because they are easy, inexpensive, and quick to download.

If you simply search for "easy quilt patterns .pdf" you will get tons of options, many of which are very

affordable. And a good set of instructions available immediately without leaving home can often be invaluable.

One caveat? Read the descriptions carefully.

Recently, a free pattern from Northcott (back when they were <u>northcott.net</u> instead of <u>northcott.com</u>) surfaced: Kool Kats Kwilt. It is sort of a "cat tail snail trail" and it is cute! Unfortunately, the downloadable pattern is

absolutely unclear to many.

A search on Etsy found a similar pattern, or at least it seemed to contain similar elements that needed to be clarified from the original pattern —specifically the spiral tail block. Upon reading the

description, it was noted that there were no instructions included! Just the diagram! What good would that be if you are buying the patter FOR the instructions?

Enjoy your search for patterns on Etsy, and be sure to carefully read descriptions of what you are ordering!

Thank you, Audrey, for bringing in your exquisite work. Each and every one is beyond beautiful!
















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2022-2023 GSBQ Quilting Challenge

If you've known me, Mary-Ellen, long enough, you know my secret crush is Kaffe Fassett! Before the pandemic, I had plans to go to a book signing or class where he would be presenting or teaching, then hide behind a plant and follow him to his hotel. For what reason, I have no idea! Except to say I love his fabrics so much!!!

I also love his books...and find endless inspiration just turning the pages. His prints are exactly my cup of tea! For some, his fabrics are an acquired taste, if a taste for them is ever acquired at all.

However, if you want to check out a book that has many options, I highly recommend Simple Shapes, Spectacular Quilts by Kaffe Fassett with Liza Prior Lucy.

Not only do I love every quilt in this book, the photographs showcase all the elements so that everything is just so pretty to look at.

Squares, rectangles, triangles: there are 23 quilts that can be simply sewn together, so you can focus on the fabric, his or your favorites.


The diagrams are excellent, although the book has templates, which I dislike intensely! The templates are marked with seam allowances, and there is one for appliqueing onto a fan block that is clearly noted with regard to lack of seam allowance.


If you are a true beginner, or don't rotary cut, the templates are absolutely


valuable. There are a couple with curves where they are mandatory.

If you prefer to rotary cut and keep your math skills honed, measuring the templates and rotary cutting is the option I prefer.

Of course, there are many other Kaffe Fassett books (I have most!) that inspire me, or at least make me







smile when I browse through them. In fact, while (whilst, if you read enough Kaffe!!!) I was looking for photos, it became clear I must update my collection!

Quilters in the Kitchen!

Gerrie Fitzpatrick: Peach Dumplings

Ingredients

2 15 oz. canned peaches, drained

2 8 oz refrigerated crescent roll dough

1 cup (2 sticks) butter

2/3 cup granulated sugar

2/3 cup brown sugar

3 teaspoons cinnamon

1 1/2 cups sprite or citrus soda

Vanilla ice cream, for serving



Directions:

Preheat oven to 350° F and thoroughly grease a 9x13 baking dish. Open crescent dough and separate into triangles.

Place one or two peach slices (depending on size) at the wide end of the dough triangle. Sprinkle with a pinch of cinnamon and roll dough around peach. Once dough is secure, move dumpling to the baking dish. Repeat with the rest of the dough.

Melt the two sticks of butter in a large bowl and combine with the white sugar, brown sugar, and the remaining cinnamon until smooth.

Using a large spoon, pour the butter mixture over the dumplings. Pour the Sprite around the dough avoiding the tops for a crispy crust to the dumplings. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until the dough is just browning on top.

Serve warm and top with vanilla ice cream.

Quilters in the Kitchen!

Susanne Pers: Valentine Treats for Furry Friends (from savoryonline.com)

Ingredients

2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for work surface 2 large eggs 1/2 cup canned pumpkin

1/4 cup natural peanut butter (without xylitol)

IMPORTANT NOTE: Some peanut butters use a natural sweetener called xylitol that is unsafe for dogs. Be sure to check the label before using.



Directions:

Preheat oven to 325°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. To a large bowl, add the flour, eggs, pumpkin, and peanut butter. Add a pinch of salt. Stir until well combined. Use hands to knead dough into a ball.

Lightly flour your work surface and top of dough. Using a rolling pin, roll dough to a ½-inch thickness. Cut shapes out of dough using 2½- to 3½-inch dog bone—shaped cookie cutters. Reroll any dough scraps for more treats.

Transfer treats to baking sheet. Bake 20–30 min., until golden brown and hard (oven time will depend on the treat size). Cool completely. Refrigerate in an airtight container for up to 2 weeks.

Many of us have fallen down "rabbit holes" on the internet. You know, when you see something new or interesting, and wind up spending hours finding out more, digging up the backstory, or just jumping from one account to another. Curse you, Instagram!!!

During Black History Month, I figured I would share some sewing-related content that has made me think. These are all my own thoughts, and it would take much more than one column to sort it out. I can tell you it all started watching a really talented historical garment maker on Instagram, and because I am a total fabriholic!

The Instagrammer decided to recreate a gorgeous dress referred to as the "Peacock Dress." It was made for Lady Curzon by the famous House of Worth in 1902 to be worn at the coronation of King

Edward VII and Queen Alexandra. Not quite quilting related...yet.

There was a swift reaction to the recreation of this dress in the online community by costumers of color. Despite the person meticulously outsourcing the exquisite embroidery to thread artists in India, the dress triggered a reaction regarding the colonization of India, as well as the many aspects of the muslin industry (fabric!) at that time.

Costumers of color refer to themselves as such because many in the historical costuming community in general host or plan events that are not welcoming to everyone. For just one example, a lovely young, non-white costumer made a wonderful elf costume to wear at a Tolkien festival. She was quite quickly told: There were no black elves in "Lord of the Rings."

Similarly, some Charles Dickens and Jane Austen event organizers have been identified as making costumers of color feel unwelcome, and unsafe.

A particularly tense situation came up when one Jane Austen group decided to hold a festival on the grounds of a former plantation. Some costumers of color expressed outrage and sadness about their prospects of feeling happy and able to have fun at an event in a place where their ancestors were enslaved, sold, and separated, if not killed.

That is how this brought me to think about cotton. The joy we all feel when we see quality quilting fabric marked with "100% cotton." How proud we are in grade school when we learn of the 13 colonies.

They say ignorance is bliss, and it is hard to think of our beautiful fabrics as problematic. I can only hope that I don't become defensive when seeking more knowledge, and that it helps guide me to be open to new viewpoints not only during Black History Month, but throughout the year.
