












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Goodness, Graciousness!

A Visit to the AQS Quilt Show In Branford, Missouri

On March24, I attended the AQS quilt show in Branson, MO. Following are my observations and photos of the exhibits:

My first overall impression from the show was that quilters have really embraced embellishments. All sorts of quilts were bedazzled. Makers of art quilts really took to the embellishing, but also traditional quilt patterns in bed sizes also were covered with bling.

One special category at this show was Baltimore Quilts. Some makers followed the traditional images, but others were very imaginative in their interpretation of this genre.

The Cherrywood Challenge this year was Graffiti. Participants were restricted to eight specific fabrics. Any other colors desired had to be introduced through some other medium such as thread, paint, pencil, ink, beads, etc. The submissions were very inventive and colorful and looked like graffiti art.

A display of all-star quilts of valor was another interesting exhibit. Quilting mavens like Marianne Fons, Virginia Findley Wolfe, and Mark Lipinski made quilts to be donated to veterans. Mark Lipinski's quilt was the one he demonstrated at a workshop I took here on LI several years ago. Quilters for the most part stuck to red, white and blue color schemes, but Paula Nadelstern's quilt was very Paula Nadelstern.

There were quilts where the designer used selvages. Now I have some inspiration on how to use up my collection. This maker had some collection. This award winner included selvages in her design.

This award winner drew a lot of attention. It is made up of hundreds of 1 ½ inch paper pieced squares.

When I arrived that morning around 9:30, I was in time to see someone interview the first and second place winners.

There were a number of modern quilts as well.

I, of course, spent more time with the vendors than with the quilts. Surprisingly, I managed to get everything in my bags without having to pay a excess baggage fee on the plane. I also had a wonderful time watching my granddaughter in her high school play, which was the real reason for the trip. I hope next year's play coincides with the quilt show in Branson.

Quilters in the Kitchen!

Providence Block: Sour Cream Pound Cake

Ingredients

1 stick butter, room temperature

1 1/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup sour cream

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

3 large eggs

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350° F.
In a large mixing bowl,
cream the butter and sugar
together. Add the sour cream and

mix until incorporated. Sift the baking soda and flour together. Add to the creamed mixture alternating with eggs, beating in each egg 1 at a time. Add vanilla.

Pour the mixture into a greased and floured loaf pan. Bake for 40 minutes to 1 hour or until toothpick inserted int the center of the cake comes out clean.

This recipe could be doubled and baked in a 10-inch tube pan.

Sandy Maniscalco: Fudge Crinkle Cookies

Ingredients

1 box Betty Crocker Supermoist Devil's Food Cake mix 1/2 cup vegetable oil 2 large eggs Powdered sugar



Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F.

Combine mix, oil, and eggs together by hand until a soft dough forms.

Dust hands with powdered sugar and form dough into 1-inch balls and roll them in the powdered sugar.

Place on ungreased cookie sheets about 2 inches apart. Bake 9-10 minutes until centers are set.

Remove from cookie sheet and place on wire racks to cool. Enjoy! Note: I sometimes uses strawberry cake mix, or vanilla cake mix and sprinkle them with cinnamon sugar.
