If you know Audrey Collins, you know she is an accomplished quilter who has perfected nearly every quilting pattern known...from appliqué to log cabin extravaganzas!


But you may not know that in 1991, Audrey's American Pie quilt appeared in an issue of Traditional Quiltworks Magazine!

Quilters in the Kitchen!

Gerrie Fitzpatrick: Chicken Enchilada Casserole

Ingredients

1 can cream of chicken soup 1 4 oz. can green chilies 1 cup sour cream (light is OK)

2/3 cup milk 3 cups shredded sharp

cheddar cheese 12 corn tortillas

1 tsp. garlic powder

2 tbls. dried chopped onion

Pepper to taste



Prepare 4 cups shredded chicken however desired.

Preheat oven to 350° F.

In a bowl, combine the cream of chicken soup, sour cream, milk, chilies, and seasonings.

Cut 6 tortillas into 4 equal pieces (by cutting them in half twice).

Line the bottom of the baking dish with the tortilla pieces.

Put 2 cups (1/2) of the shredded chicken over the tortilla pieces.

Pour 1/2 of the sour cream mixture over the shredded chicken (smooth with a spoon, as needed).


Add 1/2 of the shredded cheese on top of the sour cream mixture.

Cut up 6 more tortillas into quarters and place them over the shredded cheese.

Repeat the layering process by adding the remaining chicken, then the remaining sour cream mixture, and the rest of the shredded cheese.

Cover with foil and bake for 40 minutes. NOTE: Wonderful when served with Spanish rice, beans, guacamole (or slices of avocaado), and even a fresh side salad.

Book Nook

There are so many videos on free motion quilting, and books too! And so many of them make it look so easy...and frustrate beginners until they give up.

One of my all-time favorite books is called "Machine Quilting Solutions: Techniques for Fast & Simple to Award-Winning Designs" by Christine Marracini.

What is so terrific about this book is that the author gives quilters permission to quilt on a simple level.
Sure, she has lots of ideas for intricate and stunning free motion quilting designs. But more important to beginning quilters are the easier ideas for what she

calls, "dragger" quilts...the ones that toddlers lug around with them for years...dragging them in mud, spilled chocolate pudding, even spaghetti sauce.

There are also examples of how to quilt a "keepsake" quilt...one for a special event or milestone, as well as "showstopper" quilting suggestions. And, of course she has general advice, as well as lots of photographs to illustrate the concepts.

More and more, I tend to look at donation quilts as an opportunity to learn and practice free motion quilting. Just learning the flow of your machine is fine. It only has to hold together the three layers...it doesn't have to have feathers, or rows and rows of echo quilting around each motif, or even THAT much quilting. The quilting only needs to make sure that quilt doesn't shift around while it is loved.

If you have always wanted to free motion quilt, but are afraid to just jump in, give this book a peek. You may find yourself having more fun than you expect!
