President's Message

During these cold, wet, rainy days of winter, we quilters undoubtedly have many projects to keep us busy inside the comfort of our homes. Although our focus is on the art of quilting, one of the most beautiful embellishments we can add to our creations is embroidery. As February is National Embroidery Month, I took some time to research the history of this art and found some interesting facts I'd like to share.

National Embroidery Month began in 1992 to promote commercial monogramming and embroidery. However, since then, the observance has spread to hobbyists, museum enthusiasts, and commercial pursuits. Though most commercial embroidery is now done by computerized machine, the craft itself is believed to clate back to 30,000 B.C. Cro-Mag ion men and women, according to archaeological discovery, used fibrous plant threads and the sinews of animals to sew intricate rows of ivory, shells, and other materials to their various coverings and clothing. Other discoveries reported from Siberia and locations near there, as well as from Egypt, show embroidery used not only as decoration, but as a historical record and as a sign of social status.

One of the most fascinating aspects of this art is that after WWI, embroidery was widely used as a form of therapy for British, Australian, and New Zealand soldiers wounded in the War, which certainly challenged the gender construct of it as "women's work" prevalent at the time. Many of the hospitals tending the wounded during and after the War provided bright. clean, quiet environments where the men could perform meditative, transformative work that was essential to their rehabilitation from their physical and mental wounds. It was known as "fancy work."

So, if you embroider, celebrate this month by sharing your favorite items. Teach someone to embroider or take up embroidery for the first time. Create a new, challenging design or give a gift of embroidery to someone you love! Happy Embroidering!



Recently, Allison, Joanie and I went to a quilt retreat weekend at "Bloom Fabric, Art & Retreat" which is located in Margaretville, New York. It was an easy three-and-a-half-hour drive to this beautiful shop which is located in the Catskills. To say that it was a fabulous experience is an understatement! We can't wait to go back this summer!

The shop/retreat space is owned and operated by a mother daughter team, Lori and Katie Rosa. Both are accomplished quilters as evidenced by the beautiful quilts that hang in their shop. The shop is fully stocked with a variety of fabrics, patterns, tools, sewing supplies, yarns and basically anything that you would need to complete your project. Classes are available if requested or as we did, we chose to relax and work on our own projects.


The shop is attached to the retreat space, so everything is very convenient. The retreat space has three bedrooms which can accommodate seven people. There are two full bathrooms and a kitchen area that was at our disposal. The workspace is well planned out with cutting tables, pressing areas and a well-lit space for our machines. They only take one retreat group at a time so we had privacy and could really relax.

Margaretville is a small "artsy" town with shops and restaurants all well within walking distance from the shop. There is a coffee shop literally next door and a pub type restaurant a few buildings down. We never even went in the car the entire weekend!

The entire shop and retreat area is adorned with beautiful quilts made by Lori and Katie who were friendly and

accommodating. The three of us experienced a weekend of friendship, relaxation, creativity and all-around good karma. We would highly recommend this facility for anyone interested in a "quilting getaway."
